

We wrapped up our English as a Second Language program for 2020-2021 in the 1st week of May. To celebrate such a great year, we hosted a thank you dinner for our teachers and graduating students.

We had about 30 students total register for both fall and spring combined. In the Spring alone we had a total of 18 registrations. On average, we had about 8-10 students in attendance every class day. Our diverse students are both from within and outside of our community. We have had students attend from as far away as Valparaiso, Indiana. Some of the cultural representations in our program include: Russia, Venezuela, Taiwan, South Korea, Columbia, Mexico, Nigeria, and Bangladesh.

Excitement surrounds the Summer English Classes that we will be offering for the very first time. It will be a six week internship opportunity for two students whose previous international internship plans fell through.

One of our weekly class prayers is that God would continue to give us opportunities to share his love and light. We are thrilled to continue to do so through the English as a Second Language classes this summer.

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## URBAN MINISTRIES by: Tony Silker

At FEC, we have the privilege of meeting all sorts of people from our neighborhood. Sometimes those people are homeless. People that own homes have many different family configurations, personalities, and passions. In the same way, people who have no home have sometimes radically different experiences and personalities. Sometimes we meet people who lack sustainable housing but hold regular jobs and participate regularly in our community. Sometimes we meet people who are altogether unpredictable. Sometimes homeless people are happy. Sometimes they're angry. They're people – you get the idea.

In the last few months, I have been spending time with one man who is less predictable and tends toward expressing anger (Let's call him Peter). I have found myself torn between the desire to champion someone who's clearly having a hard time and our need for organizational saftey. We want Peter to experience family, but we have to create a healthy environment for everyone at FEC. Last month I decided to restrict Peter from entering out premises on any basis for the foreseeable future. He reacted with anger.

Yesterday, Peter again walked to our center and he and I had the exchange that has become normal for us: "No, you can't come in, sorry. No, I can't give you a sandwich and a spot on the couch today – maybe in a little while."

I have, however, been more consistently offering to spend time with Peter off of our facility in a less programmatic capacity. Yesterday he took me up on my offer to share a walk around the block. As I walked with Peter he talked about his dreams. He talked about how his mother used to take him to the zoo when he was a child. He talked about some of the people we both know; who was up, who was down, who disappeared. For a little while we were friends. It was good.

I don't know what Peter is experiencing in terms of childhood trauma, mental health, or substance abuse, but I do know that some days he's more "himself" than other days. I don't know that there is a perfect policy for giving Peter what he needs. Realistically I will never be able to create resolution in his family and provide 20 years of stable housing. But I can challenge myself to find creative ways to be with Peter and to constantly remind him that I am not angry at him and that I want to spend time with him, because God is not angry at Him and God wants to spend time with him.

I am grateful to spend time with people like Peter and I am grateful to navigate these sorts of situations, because I believe God uses scenarios that feel like deadlock to redefine how I see salvation, companionship, and care. I am grateful for Peter.

### LOCAL FOOD PANTRY by: Rachel Madella

We use text messages each week to communicate with people from our local community about our food pantry. One memorable exchange is from a woman who comes to our pantry: "My friend went to the Family Empowerment Centers and got some chickens. He said the chickens were really big! Thank you so much again and a deep thanks to your whole organization for distributing foods and other services for many people, including myself, who are sometimes struggling to make ends meet."

Overall, we have been blessed by partnerships with churches who have come in teams to volunteer even as we provide for our local community & church family. There are a handful of regular volunteers who join us on the 1st & 3rd Saturdays of every month, but we continue to pray for long term committed volunteers. We are so grateful for those who volunteer to serve here in Rogers Park. Whether in picking up the food, distributing it to families, or cleaning up afterwards, we are so grateful for those who volunteer.
