### Soup Kitchen -Albany Park

Each Sunday afternoon, a team of faithful volunteers from an area church makes their way to the corner of Argyle and Troy, where our Albany Park center is located. As they file out of vans, they bring with them trays of food, bags of paper plates and utensils, and bins of clothing and toiletries. They have come to give what they have.

As the volunteers load back into their van, and the folks who've gathered take their plate of leftovers and head down the block to wherever they might sleep tonight, conversations continue as they go, a reminder that this experience did not just provide a few bites of food, but also allowed us to see each other as humans and to alleviate the pain of loneliness.

We are so grateful for the many people who pray, donate, and volunteer in order to make this weekly community meal possible. Our prayer is that our neighbors would know genuine friendship in this space, even as we help them to take steps towards stability.
