Did you ever meet a Good Samaritan? A stranger that notices your needs, sees you, tries to help in some way? Some of us might have friends, family, people who know us and know what we need and are there for us, but what about a time when you needed something and none of "your people" were there and a stranger stepped in to help?

In Luke 10 Jesus breaks down for a lawyer in his community what it looks like to "Love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, with all your strength, and with all your mind, and love your neighbor as yourself" through the story of the Good Samaritan. It's an interesting story because it covers so much. It touches on loving those in our proximity, loving those who are hurting and helpless, loving those who are different than us (in this case faith background, ethnicity, culture). It touches on "going the extra mile" to care. Jesus doesn't just answer the lawyer's question but paints a descriptive image of what it means to love through a compassionate, tender heart. I don't think Jesus came up with this story without his own intimate knowledge of the love of the Father and He is teaching us once again about our own heart posture.

Our ministry at Family Empowerment Centers/Redemption Church has placed us in the exact location to notice and serve those in need who often are overlooked and unseen in our community. Often the people we are serving don't have anyone else. They come to eat, receive support via access to clothing and toiletry needs, winter coats, etc. They also come for prayer, learning about God's heart through His Word, and help connecting to other resources in our neighborhood (addiction services, additional food pantries, shelters, etc.).

One of our guys that comes for the breakfast hour (but doesn't eat the breakfast) said he comes for prayer and to hear the teaching. (We do a ten-minute devotion Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday with our breakfast community) Another gentleman shared that after 20 years his son came looking for him and that he has an opportunity to repair the relationship – ***he said "this is Jesus helping me"***. Another friend came through after we helped him into an addiction program and said ***"I was dead, but now I am alive. I am sober ten months. I know God is with me."*** He expressed his gratefulness for how God helped him through the ministry here. Lastly, I recently heard from one of the guys, ***"I was a complete atheist, but time here has me thinking about God again."***

I know for myself when I get to hear and see how God's goodness is being experienced by those we serve, my heart feels full and grateful to be a part of what He is accomplishing. We see every day that He is faithful, and we are grateful for all of you who help us accomplish His kingdom work.

Thank you for your prayers, your financial gifts, your food drop-offs, the clothing and diaper resources (donuts), and all the other ways you partner with us!

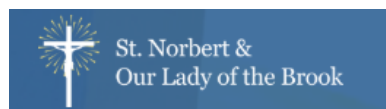

Building Hope : Encouraging Stability : Caring for Souls

I write as an immigrant mother seeking to improve the quality of life for my family, willing to get to know and be part of the community we have chosen as our new home. It is true that mothers carry that essence of protection, secrecy, and caution, but that does not exempt fathers from fulfilling that role.

A new country, a new house and school, although everything new sounds attractive, exciting, even enviable, it still carries a certain degree of unease and fear. Leaving everything familiar behind to dare to explore is for the brave or the curious. Whatever the reason that led to taking those new horizons, it does not take away the challenges that must be faced during the adjustment to that life that is about to begin.

As parents, guardians, or caregivers, we must act as guides, or seeking external help is also acceptable. Let's remember that the emotional impact is more significant for children, and for us as adults, we haven't just moved a few meters; we've moved kilometers, in some cases oceans, from our former homes. Nostalgia pervades our being and can trigger various responses, acting as a protective shield against this new experience.

This is where the support of organizations like the Family Empowerment Center is so important to the immigrant community. Knowing we have spaces that promote healthy coexistence allows for better integration into the city. The after-school program gives us the confidence to let our children socialize and participate in activities that benefit their well-being. The food pantry distribution is a great help to parents who can't work full-time. These programs strengthen the quality of life for those who benefit from them. Daniel has truly been coming into his own as one of our community pastors after graduating from our Greenhouse Leadership Developmental Residency this past summer.

Bob has been a long time member of our community and although his struggle with ALS continues to make it challenging to come out as much as he would like, he continues to bring a smile and laughter to our community.

Recently he had the opportunity to share about his experience of facing homelessness as the building he was in was sold and everyone was asked to move out. It was an overwhelming experience for someone who has a fixed income and who has physical limitations due to his ALS.

We listened as he worried, prayed with him as we talked, helped to find resources for housing, and then at what seemed like the last hour, a door opened up to move into an elevator building (necessary for his wheelchair access) and a rent that was subsidized. What felt like an impossible task was met by a God who does what seems impossible!
